Which particular common areas generate energy and enthusiasm?

First and foremost, our five churches strive to maintain and grow our worshipping congregations whereby our worship services will provide a welcoming space for all. We recognize that the traditional format of worship may change, and we will strive to achieve a smooth transition towards different forms of meaningful worship. We recognize that our strength lies in our diversity, that a weakness in one might be filled by a strength in others, for example St Paul's is skilled in its Youth work whilst others largely support the ageing populations in their parishes. We are keen to support all our communities, especially those in the areas of most deprivation and to maintain our Schools' and Prison support.

Which particular common areas are time intensive and produce little missional endeavour?

Some of our churches have found engagement with young people to be challenging, resulting in little success from much effort. We hope jointly to improve on this. Governance issues can be challenging, and we hope this can be eased by a sharing of skills and resources.

Are there areas of unique missional endeavour in particular congregations, which are engaging effectively with the local community?

Outline below.

Stepps: Weekly Chestnut Café open to community with ancillary activities intended to address loneliness in the adult community; an active Boys' Brigade Company; members have played a primary role in the creation and ongoing work of a local Community Development Trust

St Enoch's Hogganfield: Host addiction groups; host the Ethiopian Orthodox Church; Weekly NE Glasgow Foodbank; annual Christmas Tree Festival; family support for Barlinnie Prison; Art Class; Craft Class; St. Thomas's Playgroup, HSCP.

St Andrew's East: Support of Parkhill School for young people with additional needs; weekly lunch club; Brownie and Guide packs

St Paul's: Successful youth-focussed programmes provided by Youth Forum; Faith through Art worship for teenagers; Bike Library; Community Garden

Garthamlock & Craigend: Community Garden; two café groups, 0-3 years and 3-5 years, respectively; links with A Place for Change and Family Sentence, supporting prisoners, ex-prisoners and their families; Girls' Brigade; links with 3 primary schools and a nursery; two Gamblers' Anonymous groups; links with chaplaincy at Glasgow Fort and a youth project in Dumfriesshire What do you consider to be the assets which each congregation in your cluster brings to the mission plan?

- A modern, versatile, well-equipped, and well-maintained building
- An enthusiastic worship team
- A community garden and ambitions for a community café
- An ethos of welcome where diversity is embraced
- A desire to work together with our Cluster partners
- Available land next to the church building

St. Andrew's East

- Committed people with a desire to work together within the Cluster
- A church building, though small, in good shape, economical to run and with room for expansion
- A strong Guild which includes members from other churches

St Enoch's Hogganfield:

- Strong community connection with multiple hall lets serving various community services e.g., AA, CA, foodbank, dance classes, WW, HSCP Ethiopian Orthodox Church, etc. Also, yearly plans with local primary school around Easter, Christmas and end of year assembly. Pre-covid also saw us have successful Fetes (raising more than £2000 per annum), family BBQs and successful Christmas Tree Festival.
- Church building in good condition with disabled access including stair lift.
- A large sanctuary which has the potential for adaptation to provide additional meeting spaces.
- Centrally located with excellent transport links including numerous bus services and local M8 access.
- Online access for those members unable to attend in person via Facebook page and YouTube.
- Church magazine sent out quarterly to members via electronic means, where able, and also in paper format to allow for complete access across all ages and abilities.

St Paul's:

- A long-standing commitment to the poor
- A tradition of openness to the community with heavy community use of the building, including a wideranging youth project with innovative activities
- A dedicated team of accredited worship leaders, with Sunday worship being streamed through the internet

Stepps:

- A committed congregation with approx. 40 attending weekly with more tuning in virtually via our livestreamed services and midweek reflections.
- A well maintained and much-admired traditional sanctuary (with separate Halls complex well used by social groups in the local community).
- A strong and active BB Company.
- Online presence on Facebook and YouTube
- A weekly Community Café (Chestnut Café) and ancillary activities which addresses loneliness in the expanding communities of Stepps, Cardowan, Millerston and Crowwood Grange
- Active support for the Lodging House Mission

What new things can you do together which will generate energy and enthusiasm?

We share a common desire to share the gospel and love of Jesus Christ over our five parishes. We aspire towards sharing resources and talents/skills as a Cluster. We aim to develop one Kirk Session comprising Elders from all five churches. We hope to support and learn from St Paul's award-winning success with its Youth Forum. Over time, we expect more of our Church members to engage in training to help deliver alternative forms of worship across our Cluster, recognizing that traditional MWS ministry will be difficult to maintain over such a diverse and widespread cluster area. We recognize that a period of adjustment will be essential to allow congregation members and communities to get to know each other and to adapt to the new ways of 'doing church'.

Tentative discussions have already taken place regarding shared pulpit supply; joint services of worship; congregational visits to other churches; creating a Cluster identity by adopting a new Cluster name to be utilized by all five congregations; joint social events; producing a Cluster newsletter and developing a Cluster Facebook page; possibly forming a Cluster Choir; encouraging members to share their skills across the Cluster for the benefit of all five churches.

The journey ahead

STAFFING ALLOCATIONS

Our Cluster was awarded 2.0 FTE by way of staffing allocation with a further 0.9 for the two Priority areas (Garthamlock & Craigend and St Paul's).

After detailed and facilitated discussion, it was agreed that the Priority Area allocation of 0.9 should be divided by 0.4 being allocated to Garthamlock & Craigend and 0.5 being allocated towards St Paul's. Recognising the vital youth work undertaken at St Paul's, a further 0.4 will be added to St Paul's from the Cluster allocation, giving them a total of 0.9 and leaving a staffing allocation of 1.6 FTE to be employed across the Cluster.

Some input across the Cluster will be expected from the priority area staff (job descriptions to be agreed).

The remaining 1.6 FTE allocation would go towards one full-time Minister of Word and Sacrament (1.0 FTE) and a part-time (0.6 FTE) Associate Minister to work across the whole Cluster.

BUILDINGS

Our Cluster comprises five churches and five manses.

We propose that all five Church buildings are categorized A and retained, at least for the next five years, given that each serves a distinct parish district which is significantly geographically distant from the others.

We propose that all five of our Manses are categorized B, all but one of which can be disposed of within the next five years, retaining only one (yet to be identified) for an MWS.
