Highlights from the General Assembly 2022

Our New Moderator

The minister of St Margaret's Community Church in Dunfermline, Fife, will serve as the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2022-23. Rev Dr Iain Greenshields will begin his year-long role of ambassador for the Church of Scotland in May 2022, succeeding the 2021-22 Moderator, the Rt Hon Lord Wallace of Tankerness.

- Her Majesty The Queen wrote a letter to the Church of Scotland applauding the role of congregations in offering support to Ukrainian refugees and 'welcoming the stranger', as well as providing Christian concern for God's creation in tackling climate change, and supporting communities during the Covid-19 pandemic.
- Her Majesty also put forward her prayers for the leadership of the Church as they proceed to consider the future of parish life and make difficult decisions regarding buildings and congregations.
- The General Assembly has voted in favour of creating a new scheme to support parish ministers struggling to pay manse energy bills. An overture brought forward by Rev Bryan Kerr, minister of the Greyfriars Parish Church in Lanark, South Lanarkshire, called for existing Church funds to be used. He said many ministers live in "ill-equipped and expensive to run" manses with their families and some are weighing up whether they can afford to continue in their roles

• A historic vote has taken place which will allow Church of Scotland ministers and deacons to marry same-sex couples.

The General Assembly voted to change a standing church law to allow the right to apply to become an authorised celebrant to conduct same-sex ceremonies by 274 votes to 136. The decision, which would enable ministers and deacons to opt-in to a new scheme, came after a majority of presbyteries – 29-12 - approved the "Solemnisation of Same Sex Marriage Overture". "However, no minister or deacon will be required to participate in the solemnisation of, or be involved in the arrangements for, a same sex marriage unless they explicitly wished to do so.

- The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland has called for a windfall tax on oil and gas companies to help tackle the "crisis of fuel poverty".
 Commissioners backed a motion urging the UK Government to take immediate action to help the poorest in society who have been hit hardest by soaring energy bills by 288 votes to 83.
- Commissioners at the 2022 General Assembly gave a ringing endorsement to an historic agreement between the Church of Scotland and the Catholic Church in Scotland, proposing that it be named the Saint Margaret Declaration, after the 11th Century Scottish Queen venerated for her missionary Christian faith and her kindness and generosity to poor people.

The declaration of friendship offers 'a decisive and irrevocable statement of our friendship with one another, based on our shared faith in Christ.'Already approved by the Bishops Conference of the Catholic Church in Scotland, the declaration is the culmination of more than 100 years of dialogue and emphasises the shared faith and common ground that unites the Churches.

- Social care workers have been credited with transforming the lives of thousands of people over the last 12-months. Despite the ongoing challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, CrossReach staff continue to "rise to the challenge" to provide love and care to adults and children across the country.
- Congratulating the Church of Scotland on delivering a successful General Assembly in challenging times, royal representative Lord Hodge said that seeing the Kirk in action had reassured him that along with the challenges, there were new opportunities ahead. Lord Hodge, who as Lord High Commissioner is Her Majesty The Queen's personal representative to the Assembly, also used his final address to apologise for adding to those challenges by contracting Covid, postponing his inperson attendance and leading to the cancellation of the traditional open day parade and events at Holyrood Palace.

• A minister has become the first woman to take up the role of Principal Clerk of the

General Assembly on a permanent basis. Rev Fiona Smith joins a select group of people – around 40 – who have served in the leadership role since 1572. She succeeds Rev Dr George Whyte in the post, which requires in-depth knowledge of church law, history, practice and procedure.

A Wee Thought

In the week of the General Assembly, I found myself preparing a speech for an organisation in Chryston celebrating the 250th Anniversary of its founding. Its founding fathers were inspired by the Scottish Enlightenment that remarkable period from 1685 to 1815 when Scotland was, truly, a world leader.

Decisions and actions of the Church of Scotland started off this momentous period. After the killing times of the 1600's, Scotland needed a new direction and the efforts of the Church to place a school in every parish became the springboard for, arguably, the greatest period in Scottish history

The Church encouraged learning and free thinking and people such as Adam Smith, David Hume, Robert Adam and many more came to the fore. Scotland and particularly Edinburgh together with Paris and Venice became acknowledged leaders of ideas and radical thinking. Voltaire, the French philosopher said it is impossible to walk 100 yards in Edinburgh's High Street without meeting 15 men of true genius. There followed 300 years of much success and world acclaim as Scots excelled in every walk of life, with the Church playing a significant part.

Sir Winston Churchill, in his History of the British Empire said, "of all the worlds small nations no one, with the possible exception of the ancient Greeks, has made a greater contribution to world civilisation than the Scots." In 2001, A. Herman an American historian wrote a book, "*How the Scots Invented the Modern world*".

But what of Scotland today? In Glasgow we have the busiest criminal courts in Europe, the acknowledged drugs capital of Europe, distressing suicide rates, over reliance of food banks and help agencies, major health problems and, as the recent pandemic proved too many vulnerable people. We have many families who are third generation unemployed, with little motivation or purpose and who have children who sadly are likely to follow suit. Literally thousands of millions of pounds have been spent in the past fifty years to bring about improvement, yet my experience on the front line, and published statistics, tells me the situation is getting worse.

We need a change – we need a new form of Enlightenment - we should learn from the Past. Our Queen, quoting Churchill, said the further we look into the past the better we are able to plan the future. I believe Faith Groups and their leaders still command the greatest level of respect and that should be utilised to effect change

The Church is going through tremendous change - I've never seen it so animated, hopefully the awakening of a sleeping giant! My wish is that when all is settled regarding restructuring and Mission planning, the Church will take a lead to engage with other Faith Groups and together work with Government to improve the welfare and well-being of vulnerable people.

Kirk exodus

Many ministers set to quit after strain of Covid funeral surge

The Church of Scotland faces a mass exodus of ministers claims the **Daily Mail** (May 18th 2022) after a deluge of pandemic funerals took a heavy toll on officiating clergy. It comes as a drive to make the Kirk 'lean and fit for mission' sees the full-time minstry posts cut back in the next ten years.

Officials say many older clergy are thinking of retiring due to the 'vast amount' of funerals they had to carry out. The Kirk plan involves reducing the number of presbyteries and a comprehnsive review of buildings, which will see some historical churches sold off.

It says it will move away from maintaining properties 'appropriate back in the 1950s' and 'shrink' to reflect modern worship. It also warns of a 'growing deficit' as dwindling congregations mean many churches no longer pay for themselves.

The General Assembly last year approddved a plan to reduce full-time ministry posts to 600 'predicated on availability and affordability'.

Speaking ahead of this year's General Assembly, which began this week, a Church of Scotland spokesman said a reduction of around 200 posts would take into account the fact 40 per cent of current full-time ministers are over 60. As many as 60 per cent are expected to retire in the next decade.

'Took a very heavy toll'

The spokesman said: 'We have quite a number aged 60 and above. 'Given the kind of impact on ministers in the last couple of years trying to minister through the pandemic' they could retire at any time now'. He added 'They were doing a vast amount of funerals-really difficult funerals which took a very heavy toll on a lot of ministers, where they were having to tell families they could not attend.'

In future the Kirk will use trained readers, deacons and ordained part-time clergy to help share the workload of fewer full-time ministers.

The spokesman said: 'You won't have the same costs attached to them as you do with a minister, where traditionally they had a manse and a stipend. That is financially quite hard to sustain.

'There has been a real constriction in congregations and it is through the congregation that we get the funding for the minister. The money that worshippers give in the plate goes back into the central Church which is used to pay ministers.' The spokesman admitted the restructuring would involve 'painful readjustment'. He said: 'There are big changes afoot because some of the churches that are earmarked for not being used in the future are of interest to the wider public, as well as to people within the Church because they have a huge historical significance.'

The Kirk was having to make 'some quite hard decisions'. It said it is switching emphasis from trying to maintain the physical infrastructure in its current format to 'faith-based action', which includes a plan for 'delivering 100 new worshipping communities'.

The spokesman said: 'We are moving away from mainting structures that were very appropriate back in the 1950s because the majority of people were being baptised and would routinely be taken to a Church of Scotland on a Sunday - but that is not the case now. 'And we have not shrunk to reflect that.'
