Pastoral Letter Deacon Claire Herbert

"The nights are fair drawin' in" as my granny used to say. We have just past the autumn equinox. As with the Spring Equinox this is a point of seasonal equilibrium when the struggle between darkness and light tips, in autumn, towards the shortest day. We will mark the end of British Summer time or Daylight-saving time on Sunday 29th October.

As I write, the first named storm of the season, Storm Agnes, is rolling towards our shores. As a family we have just harvested this season's crop of 60 apples before they are blown to the ground.

There may be storms and darkness but I love the words of the hymn "Christ be our light" by Bernadette Farrell. The song is a prayer for light, truth and peace in the world. With the chorus

"Christ, be our light! Shine in our hearts. Shine through the darkness. Christ, be our light! Shine in your church gathered today"

Let it be our prayer in the coming months as the leaves turn and the clocks change.

We look forward to our Harvest Service here at Stepps on 8th October when our young people will be helping to gather-in the Harvest. All donations are going to LHM, to help provide meals for people experiencing homelessness.

LHM extends an invitation to everyone to join them for the Annual Service for World Homeless Day on Wednesday 11th October at 7pm at 35 East Campbell Street, Gallowgate, Glasgow, G1 5DT. The guest speaker is Rt Rev Sally Foster-Fulton, moderator of Church of Scotland.

At Stepps, we are blessed to have the Boys Brigade leading our worship at the end of the month for Founders Day and we would love it if as many people can come along and support and encourage the Boys and their dedicated officers.

While there has been strike action causing school closures, I know many of you have been stepping up and helping out as grandparents, friends and neighbours to volunteer and care for our young people. It is a source of great blessing to have so many young people in and around our church family and we pray for them and all those who offer support and care in our community, as everyone looks ahead to the October break.

While for some there may be darkness and storms, this is the season of Harvest. The lengthening nights mark the season of thanksgiving, and I am sure you will agree there is also much that the Lord has given us at Stepps worth rejoicing over.

Christ be your light – may He shine in our hearts.

Harvest Moon

The beautiful Harvest Moon is now admired simply for its beauty, but in other times it was valued for rising early in the evening and shining so brightly that it enabled farmers and their labourers to work late into the evening to clear the last of the harvest from their fields before winter arrived.

They were totally dependent on their crops of corn, wheat and barley - often from only a few small fields - to feed their cattle through the winter months, or to sell to grain merchants for much-needed income. Without the tractors and combine harvesters we have today - with lights blazing across vast fields - the farmer was dependent on the Harvest Moon. It lit the way for his horses and workers in the fields and on the narrow and rutted cart tracks, enabling them to get the last of the precious crops into the stackyard in the last few days of harvesting. It's little wonder that they praised God so gratefully in the old hymn:

Come, ye thankful people, come Raise the song of harvest-home All is safely gathered in Ere the winter storms begin God, our maker, doth provide For our wants to be supplied

To them the Harvest Moon was not an astronomical coincidence. It was a gift from God.
