Pastoral Letter Rev. Gordon MacRae

Dear Friends,

As the children return to school and church activities pick up and we slide from summer into autumn I have a quick question. What was the most important event that happened last Autumn?



Now, no taking time to think, no googling. What took place in Glasgow on the 31st of October? Score nothing if you said Halloween!

Score 10/10 if you said Cop26.

So much was made of this event. There was 24-hour news coverage.

Glasgow was the focus for the whole world.

Climate Change was a hot topic!

What about today as we approach another autumn following the hottest summer ever? As the UK faced its hottest temperatures on record in July 2022, the warmer weather sparked more and more conversations about environmental issues. Seven of the ten hottest temperatures in UK history have been recorded since 2003. All this hot air; (pun intentional!) spoken, but what have we done about it? The manse family are trying its best.

In a few weeks we will take ownership of a new car, one powered not by burning fossil fuel but by electricity. Thinking of that, as I drove my petrol burner along the polluted M80 I decided to count how many electrically powered vehicles I encountered. We used to do that to amuse the kids, how many blue cars how many red? So, I played a solitaire game of *how many "green" cars.* Journeying all the way from Pollokshields to Stepps. Guess How many??

Yes, you are correct. NONE

Now I know that such vehicles are expensive but as fuel prices rocket and the planet gets hotter and hotter, I believe we made the right choice.

What does the bible say about climate change. The bible says much about God's Good Earth but the writers could have not possibly imagined what we humans would do to that Good Earth.

However, in my studies I stumbled upon this marvelous modern paraphrase of Isaiah 57:16-19 written by Donna Schaper a senior minister at Judson Memorial Church in New York City who writes in EarthBeat a website that looks at environmental issues from a Christian persecutive. "You messed up. Then you messed up again. Then you started to believe that you were a mess. Then you started to believe that other people were a mess. You placed one negative thought after another into the universe ... and you really pissed me off. I created you. I made you. I wanted to have fun with you. Instead, I have a lot of whining and crying and impotence and febrility and fragility. Seriously? I could walk out right now and just leave you cringing in your well-accessorised corners. But instead, I am going to surprise you. I am going to stop being angry at you, the way you always want me to be angry. I am going to give you another chance to be peaceful. I am going to restore praise to your chapped lips. I am going to make your heart grateful again. Then maybe you'll go out and win a game or two for the rest of my people."

In all the games of life the toughest is facing up to this mess we have made. The largest problem we are facing is climate change. It will turn into race and class wars and many innocent people will lose their lives. Some rich people will even lose their lives.

Why? Because we have Messed Up and we have messed up BIG this time.

As I write we are hearing of massive rises in the Cost of Living, driven by the almost exponential rise in the cost of fossil fuels. We see a winter of great misery for many of us and especially for the poor of our society who spend, by far, the largest proportion of their earnings on fuel and food. In the short term we must do something something big to mitigate this scourge on the weakest of our sisters and brothers. In the long-term God demands we do something to pull ourselves back from climatic catastrophe.

Okay Jesus does not say much, if anything, about Global Warning, the bible says little about rising temperatures or wildfires. It does say something about eternal fire! Now, I have never believed *the fires of hell* were intended to be anything more than metaphor but I do believe we as humans along with all of God's Creation face *'Hell on earth'*!

So, as we approach the first anniversary of Glasgow's Cop 26, let us read again, the modernday paraphrase of Isaiah's ancient words. Ponder over them, pray with them and consider how we who follow God's Word can lead the world to wake up and see what we are doing to God's Good Earth.

Holy Communion Sunday 4th Sept

We will once again celebrate Holy Communion on Sunday the 4th of September. Currently, it is still not permitted to share common elements. Therefore, common cups will not be used and plates will not be passed from person to person. Instead, we will be serving the elements in individual glasses, after observing good hygiene practices and washing our

hands. A glass of wine and a piece of bread in individual glasses and condiments will be collected by individual worshippers.



We are delighted that Marvyn has now been formally approved and signed of as a recognised worship leader with Glasgow Presbytery having successfully completed his training with Trinity College. In addition, to his already many commitments with the Iona Community, Marvyn has also joined the Chaplaincy team at the Lodging House Mission supporting many of its service users. Over the years, the chaplaincy team has provided an invaluable tool in helping people turn their lives around. The team understand the

highly complex and sensitive nature of the problems facing the service users and will do everything to support all in need. For some of their users, spiritual support doesn't matter but for many - it's an important part of the empowerment process.

The Lodging House Mission provides dignity, love and respect to those who come through its doors - regardless of their faith and we are enormously proud that Marvyn has seen fit to offer his wisdom and experience in supporting others.

The Lodging House mission is currently seeking a Treasurer to join the board of Governors and to take the work of the LHM forwards. This is an exciting time for LHM as we re-launch and re-brand ourselves in September of this year.

Firstly, a huge thankyou to everyone who has donated items for the LHM over the last 2 months. Due to work commitments. I have been unable to collect them as quickly as I would like but do not worry, they will get to those who need them. The support that our congregation gives to the LHM is amazing and the recipients are so grateful for every item they receive from you. The next appeal that the LHM will be running is the annual Harvest Donations. Among the items requested are sweet breakfast cereals e.g., coco pops and Frosties, tins of fruit cocktail or peaches, dried herbs, spices salt and pepper as well as stock cubes, Bisto and tomato ketchup.

On a more serious note, the Scottish Drug and Alcohol related death figures for the last year were published this month and they make depressing reading. Drug deaths were pretty stagnant with a slight yearly decrease from 1339 to 1330 a decrease of 9 and alcohol related deaths increased from 1190 to 1245 and increase of 55. To put these figures in context for the whole of the UK deaths involving drugs were 67 per million however in Scotland it was 245 per million, 4 times higher of which 2 thirds were 35-44-year-old men. These figures would have been much, much higher without the partnership working between the LHM, Glasgow City Mission, the Simon Community and the HSCP's to name but a few.



Can you all please take a moment to add the families of these victims and those who are still struggling with addiction to your prayers over the coming months.

On a brighter note the LHM are looking for a hall manager and if you know of anyone interested, please tell them to get in touch with June or Helen at LHM. Glasgow city Mission are recruiting as well for the Overnight Welcome Centre which will run again from December 1st to March 31st information on the GCM website <u>Jobs</u> -<u>Glasgow City Mission</u>. Please share this information with anyone you think may be interested as it's an amazing project.

The Annual Homeless Service is being held on Friday September the 9th in the LHM first floor sanctuary and the guest speaker shall be the Rt Rev Dr Iain Greenshields, Moderator of the Church of Scotland and service users will also be participating. Doors open at 6.45. Following the service there will be hospitality provided and a chance to meet those who use the LHM, to hear their stories and what LHM means to them.

I will leave you with this thought which I have been using a lot this month.
