Pastoral Letter

Here are two questions for you all:-

- 1) What is the popular prayer among christians?
- A) The Lord's Prayer
- 2) What is the most popular prayer among non christians?
- A) The Serenity Prayer



You might not recognise the second prayer from its title but you will surely know the words

God, give me grace to accept with serenity the things that cannot be changed,
Courage to change the things which should be changed,
and the Wisdom to distinguish the one from the other.

The original version of this prayer was written by the great American theologian Reinhold Niebuhr (1892–1971) Niebuhr composed the prayer in 1932. The prayer spread rapidly, often without attribution to Niebuhr, through church groups in the 1930s and

1940s and was adopted and popularised by Alcoholics Anonymous and other twelve-step programs.

The famous prayer asks for God's help achieving something that most people desire but few can achieve: peace and happiness in life. Unlike many prayers that ask for peace or happiness, the Serenity Prayer does not simply ask that God hands us peace. Instead, the prayer lays out specific steps that will help us achieve serenity in our life and asks God to help us find the strength to live by those smaller goals.

The Serenity Prayer asks God to help us create peace in ourselves:

How do we achieve, peace; real peace and serenity?

What do you picture when you think of serenity? A really calm 'chilled out' person? A lovely peace-filled calming place; be it a physical space or a peaceful space in your mind and spirit? Serenity, calm, health, peace. They can all be summed up in the lovely Hebrew word Shalom. Are you serene? Are you at peace? Is your life one of Shalom?

I would guess that all of us crave that state of being. In these uncertain times as Covid 19 is 'still out there' threatening to return, as we make efforts to return to the 'new normal' so many speak of. What

lies ahead for us? What has to change? What should stay the same?

How do we perceive God's Will for us, for our loved ones, for the church, for the world?

We take one step at a time. That is what the '12 step' addiction programmes learn from Niebuhr's prayer. One step at a time; one day at a time. Our Lord's Prayer asks:-

Give us this day, our daily bread today's bread is all we ask for...

Jesus says, "Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself, Each day has enough trouble of its own" Matthew 6:34

So, what can we learn from Niebuhr's prayer? How do we come to a place of serenity; shalom? By seeking God's will, discerning what we need to hold onto and what we are to let go. By seeking God's help in changing what needs to be changed, retaining that which should stay the same and, by asking God to guide us as we go.

So a few more questions for you: What needs changing in you life? What are the essential permanent things in your living? What must you do to allow God to lead you further down the road to Shalom?

Welcome back to Church: Sunday 30th August Dear Friends,

We are delighted to be able to advise that we have now received notification from Glasgow Presbytery and been granted permission to reopen our church premises for worship at a reduced capacity. We will be welcoming you back to worship in our church from Sunday the 30th of August 2020.

Whilst we welcome this news it is important to remember that things will look quite different on our return.

It is anticipated that we can only accommodate up to 34 people in the sanctuary but up to 50 in total if we overspill into the Large hall. This includes those who will be stewarding the doors, myself and someone operating the AV equipment during worship as well as any families worshipping with their children as Sunday club will not take place in its usual format. Children can however be taken out to the Lesser hall after the Children's address to enjoy some activities. Several of the pews will be roped off in order to comply with social distancing. You will be asked to turn up 15 minutes before the service begins at 11.00am to allow everybody to be seated before the service begins.

Your attendance will be noted in a book for us to comply with the NHS Scotland Test and Protect service. Your name and telephone number will be kept on record for 21 days in case we have to notify the appropriate authorities of a potential COVID-19 connection if we identify anyone who has the virus symptoms.

If you have a continuous cough, high temperature, or loss of taste or smell you should not attend church.

All personal information will remain confidential and be destroyed after 21 days. It should be noted that face masks will be mandatory during the service so we ask that you please bring your own face covering where possible, but some face masks will be available for any visitors or anyone requiring one.

A one-way system will operate throughout the church entering from the East door and leaving by the South door with those on door duty assisting you to a suitable pew. Family members can sit together but must remain 2 meters apart from other members of the congregation. If you need to leave the building at any time during the service, you will be asked to take your belongings, but you will be allowed to come back into the church. We must continue

to practice good social distancing during the service and of course we should be sanitising our hands on entering and on leaving the premises. We are not permitted to sing or enjoy our usual fellowship after the service in the form of tea or coffees. In addition, we also hope to make the sanctuary available mid-week for private devotions or prayers.

Please continue to follow us on our website — Facebook page for more details. We hope that if you feel unable to attend that you watch us on our YouTube channel where our Sunday services will be live streamed and recorded.

We will be following all the relevant guidance, should anything change we will be in touch with any developments and continue to keep you all up to date on any changes to the guidance as quickly as possible.

For now, please stay safe and well and don't hesitate to contact your Elder, Gordon or myself if needed by telephone or on our email address.

Sunday Club is Back!

Hello everyone,

Sunday club will resume <u>on Sunday 6th</u> <u>September</u>

with several changes. Children cannot come into Church hall as normal before the service. We will need them to come into Church with a family adult and sit with them. After the children's address, we will go into the hall. Children will be asked to wash their hands, use hand sanitiser and may at times be asked to wear plastic gloves.

The tables and chairs will be wiped with anti bacterial spray before the children come into the hall. Each child will be given a poly pocket with their name on it. Included in the bag will be a variety of stationery items for their use only. In the Church hall we will have stories, chat and crafts relating to Gordon's address. Unfortunately, we are unable to have any games. When Church and Sunday club have finished, children will leave by the back door. Grown ups are asked to remember social distancing when collecting children.

Anne, Esther and Linda are looking forward to seeing everyone and despite all the changes, we will have a great time at Sunday club.

Stay safe and we will meet on 6th September.

Smile you're on Camera

Following our successful grant award from the Scottish Government Wellbeing Fund. We have been able to upgrade all our audio equipment and install new NDI cameras in the church during the Summer. This is a new video switching / streaming hardware system with upgraded amplification. In order to get the best location and audio- visual transmission it was necessary to refashion one of the pews to create a new AV workspace at the rear of the Nave of the Church. This will allow us to live stream our services on our new YouTube Channel. Simply log onto YouTube and search for Stepps Parish Church and subscribe to our channel. If you'd prefer to remain out of camera shot, you can do so by sitting over in the West Aisle. In addition to the technical equipment upgrade, installation of a comprehensive wi-fi system to enhance the church's use for the wider community has been installed. We now have 4 wi-fi hot spots throughout the premises 2 in the Sanctuary-Vestry and 2 in the hall. This means that if needed we can also transmit and stream the service into the Large Hall allowing us to increase our worshipping numbers to 50 people if the hall is not required by the children of the Sunday Club. All the upgraded works has been linked into existing loudspeakers and overhead screens which remain of sufficient standard for present and future use but upgraded to digital amplification with new ambient microphones to enhance the audio experience throughout the sanctuary. I hope you will all agree that this upgrade will continue to reach far and wide to our worshipping community and provide improved facilities for the foreseeable future.

If you would like to form part of our AV Operating Team on a Sunday morning or simply like to dabble with technology please contact either Gordon or myself and we would be happy to add you onto a Sunday rota in case cover is required over the coming months during these uncertain times. Together we can come together for the enhancement of everyone's worshipping experience.
